Social Justice Sunday



In a tradition reaching back to 1940, the Australian Catholic Bishops release major social justice statements each year in time for Social Justice Sunday. Through this tradition they contribute to the development of local Catholic Social Teaching. The statements encourage the Catholic community to reflect and act on social, economic and ecological issues. They remind us of the social dimension of the mission of the Church.

Previously Social Justice Sunday was celebrated on the last Sunday in September. From 2020, Social Justice Sunday will be celebrated in Australia on the last Sunday in August.

This Sunday in Parishes across the diocese the 2021- 2022 'Cry for the Earth, Cry for the Poor' Social Justice statement was launched.

Did you know that on January 4th 2020,

- Penrith was the hottest place on Earth at 48.9°C (halfway to boiling point)
- Parramatta sweltered through 47 days with temperatures over 35°C.

It is for the facts above that Part 3 of the Statement is a call to an Ecological Conversion

An ecological conversion calls us to:

- A renewed way of understanding the cosmos and humanity;
- A new vision of what it is to be a human being before God and in the world;
- A new spirituality, or way of understanding and expressing our relationship with the Divine in our lives;
- To bring about lasting change, it must also be a "Community Conversion";
- We are being called to a new way of thinking, feeling, understanding and living.

Cry for the Poor

Pope Francis is calling us to prepare positively for a better future by listening to those most affected - the earth, the poor and the young. Currently we are asking The Federal Government for compassion and true leadership to support people impacted by the unfolding crisis in Afghanistan, including an immediate increase of Australia's intake of humanitarian refugees, says Jesuit Social Services.



The Catholic Alliance for People Seeking Asylum – which represents leaders across the Catholic Church, health, education, refugee and social services – continues to offer its collective assistance to help settle displaced people from Afghanistan. "We know the support in the community is there to help vulnerable and displaced people through this crisis. The time is now for our Federal Government to step up and demonstrate true care, compassion and leadership to people in their time of great need."



Dance Fever Disco











READING FOR PLEASURE - A DOOR TO SUCCESS

Aside from the sheer joy of exercising the imagination, research shows reading for pleasure improves literacy, social skills, health, and learning outcomes.

The Education Standards Research Team (ESARD) in the UK, compiled the *Research evidence on reading for pleasure* report. It found that reading for pleasure had educational benefits and had a positive impact on reading including:

- reading attainment and writing ability
- text comprehension and grammar
- breadth of vocabulary
- positive reading attitudes
- self-confidence as a reader
- pleasure in reading in later life.

The Research evidence on reading for pleasure report also identified benefits in:

- general knowledge
- understanding of other cultures
- community participation
- insight into human nature and decision-making.
