Building Teacher Capacity

In our diocese, teachers are invited to train as Extending Mathematical Understanding (EMU) specialist teachers. Identified Year One students participate in an intervention program. Students are involved in a range of activities to promote their mathematical thinking. Ms Conley undertook this training last year. On Tuesday, Ms Conley was invited to do a

demonstration lesson for the new group of training teachers from our diocese. I had the opportunity to witness Ms Conley work with these students. It was obvious that Ms Conley knew these students well and was able to guide them to work from what they know to solve new problems and create new learnings.



Peer Review

Peer Review is a key part of the School

Compliance audit process which allows all schools to view, assess and provide critical feedback on the curriculum presented by the school being reviewed. The process of Peer Review enables all schools to ensure that they are fully compliant according to NESA and CEDP requirements. A sampling approach is used to target specific Key Learning Areas and stages of learning and examine these in close detail to ensure that they are meeting syllabus requirements and overall NESA specifications.

Yesterday, our Stage 2 teachers (Ms Sarina and Mrs Bessounian) were called to Peer Review with two of our neighbouring schools. Ms Sarina and Mrs Bessounian received many commendations for their work. Some of the commendations included; the ability to meet the students' needs, providing differentiation in learning, clearly set out programs and using a variety of assessment strategies.

St Oliver's is privileged to have such dedicated and professional teachers as Ms Conley, Ms Sarina and Mrs Bessounian.

Gospel Jn 6:41-51

A reading from the gospel according to John *I am the living bread come down from heaven.*

The Jews were complaining to each other about Jesus, because he had said, 'I am the bread that came down from heaven.' 'Surely this is Jesus son of <u>Joseph</u>' they said. 'We know his father and mother. How can he now say, "I have come down from heaven"?' Jesus said in reply, 'Stop complaining to each other. 'No one can come to me

unless he is drawn by the Father who sent me, and I will raise him up at the last day. It is written in the prophets: They will all be taught by God, and to hear the teaching of the Father, and learn from it, is to come to me. Not that anybody has seen the Father, except the one who comes from God: he has seen the Father. I tell you most solemnly, everybody who believes has eternal life. I am the bread of life. Your fathers ate the manna in the desert and they are dead; but this is the bread that comes down from heaven, so that a man may eat it and not die. I am the living bread which has come down from heaven. Anyone who eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I shall give is my flesh, for the life of the world.'



Literal Sense – The Jews

It might strike the reader as a little odd that this gospel passage begins with 'The Jews were complaining to each other about Jesus'. Surely, Jesus and his disciples were also Jews, so why the derogatory use of 'the Jews'? At the time that this gospel was being written (probably in the last decade of the 1st Century) the Christians were firmly at odds with the Jewish community and were in fact banned from attending Jewish synagogues. This conflict is reflected in the way the Jews are portrayed throughout the Gospel of John.

Scriptural context – Who is Jesus?

One of the great concerns of the Gospel of John is to convey an understanding of who Jesus is. This powerful message is conveyed through a number of significant discourses – with Nicodemus, with the Samaritan woman, with the Jews etc. The gospel contains some of the 'great' images that we have for Jesus: living water; living bread; light for the world; the good shepherd; the way, the truth and the life. As opposed to the more narrative synoptic gospels, this gospel can be seen as a gospel rich in imagery and theological perceptions.

Application in the Eucharist – Living Bread

There is an obvious connection between this week's reading and the sacramental celebration of Eucharist. Jesus describes himself as living bread and then says whoever eats this living bread will live forever. These words capture the essence of the Church teaching about the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. Jesus is present in several ways at the celebration of Eucharist, particularly present in the bread and wine that become his body and blood. Through our celebration of the Eucharist, Jesus offers us his continuing, enduring presence.
